Interview with Mr. Lundberg

Amelie: What do you teach at Pollard?

Mr. Lundberg: Seventh Grade ELA!

Amelie: How long have you worked here?

Mr. Lundberg: Hmm. That's a really good question. Should I tell you the truth or a lie? I think I have to tell you the truth. This is my 21st year.

Amelie: That's cool!

Mr. Lundberg: No, you're supposed to say, "Whoa, you're old!"

Amelie: OK, whoa, you're old! Mr. Lundberg: Thank you, Amelie.

Amelie: What did you do to your leg, and how?

Mr. Lundberg: So I have what's called a ruptured Achilles, which means that the tendon is not torn, not scratched, not stressed, it's just gone. It snapped in two, and they have to tie it back together again.

Amelie: Ouch.

Mr. Lundberg: And then they tell you to just, "Suck it and wait six to nine months for it to heal."

Amelie: Ooh. Does it really hurt? Mr. Lundberg: Yeah, it's a little painful, less so now, but days after the surgery it was always kind of painful, and now its just like every once in a while I get a twang of pain down there, like if I don't keep it up, or if its down for too long it kind of gets to me. It's not too bad.

Amelie: What's one weird fact about you?

Mr. Lundberg: I guess this is a little weird: I sang for about three years in a Scandinavian A Cappella group.

Amelie: Cool!

Mr. Lundberg: It's kind of weird though. My wife, its kind of her group now, she and four other ladies, and I drum for them a little bit, but it was a bigger group. It was like, 20 people at one point for about 20 or 30 years. I only sang with them for like three years because I was knew to singing, but it was pretty cool. We sang in Swedish, Norwegian, Icelandic, Finnish, maybe a song in Danish at one point? Some Latin. It was weird. But actually, the music is pretty beautiful. It's folk music. It's quite nice.

Amelie: What is one good book recommendation? Mr. Lundberg: Hmm. How about Tom Wolf's The Right Stuff. Amelie: Interesting. Mr. Lundberg: Yeah. There are so many books to recommend. Riley: What's that about? Mr. Lundberg: It's basically about what was called the "Space Race" back in the 50s and 60s, when the US was sort of in competition with Russia to get to the moon first, you know, explore other planets. It's really more of non-fiction but it reads like a novel, so that's what Tom Wolf did as a journalist, he took real stuff and wrote magazine articles and full length books in more story telling form. He just had a really neat energetic writing style that I loved. That book is really good. I like his magazine pieces the best, but that was a super good book.

There's also a snapping turtle involved in the story. There's a little bit of social commentary then about organized sports being too organized. It's a lot of pressure, if you know what I mean.


