17 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR WRITING

Whether you write for school or at home, use these tips to enhance your words!

• Take notes!

Although this can be annoying, and sometimes even intimidating, taking notes on your work can be really helpful! Keeping track of everything from character descriptions, backstory, what's expected to come next, locations, or even just the overall plot can really help you remember all the small details. You can do this in a separate document, in a notebook or notepad, or in anything you won't lose. This way, when you're stuck or just need to add in a little something to kick the scene up a notch, you have all the right resources in one place.

• Brackets as fillers.

Sometimes you just can't put your thoughts into words. That's when you can use brackets! Brackets can help you organize your thoughts so you aren't stuck in one spot for a long period of time. Even mid sentence, you can put the brackets there, write a small summary of what you wish to fill them with, and close bracket. There are even easy ways to make sure you *do* fill all the brackets before you're done! Which leads me to my next tip.

• Find and replace.

You all probably know about this already, but do you know all it can be used for? If you're in google does, click edit in the top left corner,

and then hit find and replace. There, you can search for letters, words, sentences, or brackets, that you may want to change. Sometimes I don't even use the replacement portion. If I want to see how many pronouns I've used rather than descriptions, or if any word I've said is overused, I can check back on that. If you realize you've been spelling something wrong this whole time, you can use this! Changing names at the last minute? Find and replace.

• Use a thesaurus.

 This is a really basic tip, but sometimes words really are too bland

Beta readers.

Ok. Everyone has their own style. You don't have to take all of their opinions, but sometimes having someone look over your piece is great. It's good to get some constructive feedback from an audience, rather than what the voice in the back of your head says. Just make sure you feel everything you've written is solid and you're ready to share. You can use your teachers, friends, or anyone you feel comfortable reading your work! Taking criticism is a basic life skill we'll all have to master someday.

• Keep it interesting.

Nobody wants page long descriptions of minor objects that play no role. Even if nothing much is happening in the moment, fill your empty space with flashbacks, internal monologue, dialogue, or anything else that may be important.

- Keep it real.
 - Although fantasy means that unrealistic things can happen, keep your characters real. Nobody is going to walk for hours without complaining or make forty impossible shots in a row (unless, of course, there are extraordinary circumstances).
- Lessen the confusion.
 - Going back to the take notes section, especially if you're writing a fantasy story, make sure it all makes sense and there aren't any loose ends. Coming up with your own world can be tricky, especially if it means you're making up all the rules. Add in all the details, even if you think it goes without saying. Anything that's different from our human world today should be included in your description. Be sure that nothing contradicts and when asked a question, you are able to give a solid answer that you can support. This is crucial for the readers to understand your creations as well as you do.
- Characterizations are everything.
 - o I don't know about you, but if I want something to read, I'm not looking for a specific genre. I look for something with characters that I can relate to, characters that might be silly or stupid or fiery tempered but always interesting. Make them stand out. I don't want to read about five teenagers with blurred

personalities that never say anything that would alter the way I think. Sure, it may be stereotypical to have a smart one, a funny one, and the one with all the problems. But it sure is more interesting that way, and there are a lot of other people describing adjectives you can use. Think of it this way: if there's a line of unique dialogue, you should be able to pinpoint one character where, "Oh, that totally sounds like something they would say." That's why nobody's favorite character in *Harry Potter* is Harry Potter. He's just a boring boy who only ever wears two shirts without his two best friends, who both have very distinct personalities.

- You've heard this a million times, but here's one more. Show, don't tell.
 - Teachers say this all. Of. The. Time. But what exactly does that mean? It's like the difference between a statement and an image. The difference between a smiley face and the Mona Lisa. It's going between all the fine lines of an idea and stretching it out so it's something you can see, hear, or feel. Find how quickly 'I live on a busy street,' turns into the sound of screaming New Yorkers in your ears.
- Don't get hung up on the little things.
 - o Don't have a title? Haven't named your characters? You're not quite sure what they look like yet? Don't sweat it. Use those brackets to

- add it all in later. Don't worry much about spelling or grammar while you're drafting, either. That's what editing is for!
- Make a playlist.
 - o If you're one of those people who can listen to music while they work, please do. Just make sure your playlist fits the vibe of the piece. You shouldn't be writing a sad scene while playing *Happy* or *Don't Stop Me Now* in the background. Music may help you focus or inspire the flow.
- Leave traces of you.
 - Generally speaking, writing is better and bolder when you know a lot about your topic. What do you know better than you? Write about your own character traits or hobbies to better understand what to say.
- Read!
 - The best way to learn to write?
 Read! You can never go wrong with this. Observe how your favorite authors phrase things, their dialogue patterns, how they start off sentences or set scenes. Don't ever copy them, but this should give you a pretty good idea on what you should be doing.
- Observe *everything*.
 - Along with authors, observe everything else around you too! I don't mean sit outside and watch the birds with a pen and notepad (unless that's what you want to do), but see how different people react to different situations. Look at the

- way the trees move in strange weather. The sound a car makes when it starts. Store it all away until you need it.
- Think about joining a group.
 - This doesn't have to be a set in stone group, but especially if you're writing as a hobby, try to find like-minded people to help give you advice. There are some camps and other programs that you can work with, or you could just find some students right here at the school. If you love to write, see if you can find someone (or multiple people) who also like to write. Fast questions can be answered quickly, thought out well, and thoroughly discussed with an actual human who isn't Google.
- Do whatever works for you!
 - whatever weird quirks you have, if they improve your writing, if they make you more comfortable, go for it. When it comes to writing, don't let anyone tell you what to do. You can only think when you're writing in green pen longhand? Go for it. You have to be standing up? Sure. Whatever it takes to bring your writing to its peak.


